Selling Green to the Government

Waters is an expert on selling “green” to the government, most recently by coordinating a multiple-state effort to promote bio-based companies to federal government purchasing departments.

Waters has more than 20 years of experience working with businesses to increase energy efficiency, eliminate waste at the source, implement sustainability, and utilize Green Teams. Waters has an M.S. in Chemical Engineering and is currently Program Services Manager at the Nebraska Business Development Center. She is the former pro-

gram manager for the Pollution Prevention Resource Exchange (P2Rx) and was director of the Pollution Prevention Institute (PPI) at Kansas State University. Waters received the Most Valuable Pollution Prevention “P2 Champion” award from the National Pollution Prevention Roundtable in 2009.

Waters consults individually with businesses on environmental management systems, pollution prevention assessments, air permits, including Title V permitting, and pollution prevention planning. Waters was a process engineer for Raytheon Aircraft and plant chemist for Koch Fiberglass, both in Wichita, Kansas.
